

### ***JARC is moving into the 21st century with its technology!***

We are tremendously grateful to have received funding from The Jewish Fund for a grant to implement an electronic health record system. The system will replace the paper charting staff makes daily for each person we serve, making it accessible in real time from any location.

With this system, JARC can harness the power of technology to determine which interventions are working and moving toward goal achievement and which are not.

There are countless benefits, the least being increased safety for our persons served as their information will be available in moments. This is a game changer for JARC and how we work with those who rely on us to take care of them.

In addition to our electronic health record system, we also instituted new electronic scheduling software for staff in the homes. Prior to the technology being introduced, each of the 30 homes maintained its own staffing schedule on paper. This was a cumbersome process that took many hours of time from our managers.

This new technology has made it easier not only to schedule, but for staff to know exactly when they are working. This frees up valuable time for our managers to focus on the people we serve.

My first year at JARC has been a great one! Now in our 50th year, we are looking forward to what the future holds and how we can continue to improve lives for those we serve and staff.

Thank you for helping us come this far and for investing in JARC's future.

I hope to see you at our 50th Anniversary Spectacular with Earth, Wind and Fire on November 3!

# THE FIRST JARC HOME



Bill Miller and Gabe Slomovitz lived in JARC's first home

**What began as a small group of parents who incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1969 as the Parents Association for Jewish Residential Care (later to be renamed JARC), within two years had more than 200 members.**

In 1971, with the help of Sam Frankel, the first JARC home was purchased. Located on Seven Mile Road and Evergreen in Detroit, the home was formerly known as Sheruth House, used as a temporary home for young adults and children by the Jewish community.

Within the year, four men and three women moved into the Haverim Home, after the Hebrew word for friends. But it was more than a home for friends. It was a place where adults with developmental disabilities could live in dignity. Trained staff provided 24-hour care. The residents could learn household chores, how to work together, how to make choices, and be part of a community.

"During those early years, we had a group of committed parents who worked hard to maintain a presence in the community," said JARC past president Norman Wachler, reflecting on JARC history during the organization's 25th anniversary in 1994. "With the opening of our first home, we were hopeful for the future."

## JARC IS A FORTUNATE RECIPIENT OF THE ETHEL HYMAN LIVING TRUST. WE SAT DOWN WITH JACK KAUFMAN TO TALK ABOUT THE TRUST WHICH PROVIDED A TRIP TO FLORIDA FOR SEVEN MEN AND WOMEN JARC SERVES.

*JARC: What is the goal of the trust?"*

JK: When her sister Rose Kaplan passed away Ethel put in motion the formation of the foundation that clearly they had discussed and planned together. They understood the loneliness and isolation of their senior years and wanted to use whatever remaining of their joint savings after their deaths to be used to provide entertainment for seniors with the caveat of recognizing the need for transportation to events. The fiduciaries of the foundation, Karen Amber, Jay Richard and myself, have chosen to interpret the word "entertainment" as "enrichment" and to have a very loose definition of "senior."



*JARC: "What is your philosophy on how people can support organizations like JARC?"*

JK: I believe there are certain things in life that make us feel really good, and I am not thinking of having money or a great meal, but emotional things like holding a door open for a blind person. I could probably list dozens or possibly hundreds. Not-for-profit organizations need help in holding doors open, so giving of my time, expertise or money makes me feel really good. It's truly a selfish pursuit.

*JARC: Why was JARC chosen to be a recipient of the foundation's generosity?"*

JK: Actually, I would have chosen JARC, but it was Rose and Ethel's choice, amongst several other organizations as well. Ethel has given me a great and joyful responsibility that I am learning about on almost a daily basis. My personal goal is to have other folks join me in this great opportunity to help open doors.

Linda finds her work very meaningful because of the wonderful things JARC does for her son. But she never expected to gain a friendship for herself and her son by volunteering at JARC.

Marcia feels that her friendship with Linda is special. Their time at JARC and the fact that their children are both served is what "brought us together, but our friendship doesn't revolve around it." Marcia, similarly, to Linda, became a JARC volunteer because of her extreme gratitude to JARC and "knowing that my daughter has a place where she has grown and will grow for the rest of her life."

Marcia's daughter, Denise, is amicable and outgoing. Denise is known by many for her friendly personality. A couple of weeks ago, Linda, Marcia, and their children Jonathan and Denise went to Soul Café and enjoyed a meal together. They had a great time, and it was "nice to be able to socialize, just us as friends enjoying a social situation," said Marcia of their night out.
